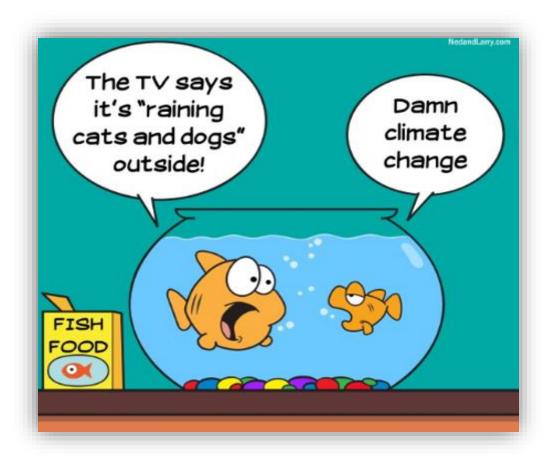

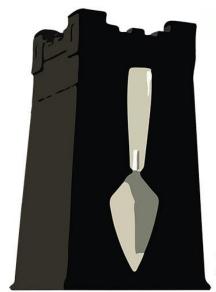

Do you fancy dusting off the old trowel or learn how to use one properly?

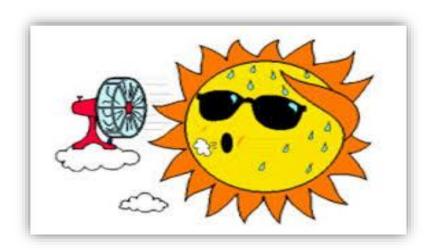

BFBS Academy training for the Armed Forces, their families and veterans seeking social media expertise

Over the past 12 months the BFBS Academy – which is part of military charity and media organisation BFBS – has launched two online courses offering in-depth training to help people use social media to grow their business, or to find a career in social media.

There is a 25% military discount, and the money raised with this programme will be put back into the Social Media Spouses programme to fund the ongoing support offered for military spouses.

Social Media Spouses

It's first course 'Social Media Spouses', which launched in April last year, is designed to address a real need amongst military spouses and partners to obtain the skills they need to find flexible and interesting work that fits around military and family life.

The course is funded by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust and is the first free online course to offer military spouses and partners vocational, in-depth, fast-track online training in social media, together with their own dedicated digital training community.

Places are limited and open to military spouses or partners only. 'Digital CULTure'

Building on the success of Social Media Spouses, BFBS Academy has developed the same I I-week online course and digital community to enable a wider audience, including Service leavers and others in the armed forces, to gain the skills they

need to secure a job in the digital industry or to expand their own business through social media.

The Digital CULTure course costs £399, which includes access to the online community, a course completion certificate and subscription to the monthly newsletter, filled with the latest developments in social media marketing.



About the courses

Both courses are taught by the BFBS social media team, who are part of the military community and are responsible for BFBS' social media channels.

They use a combination of online learning tools, live lessons and mentoring and each student will have weekly virtual lessons with a dedicated social media coach, who'll guide and support them throughout the

They offer access to an exclusive online community where individuals can find advice on careers in social media, content or campaigns. The course leaders will also offer ongoing support and feedback on anything related to social media.

Both courses focuses on the following areas of social media:

- Understand Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and LinkedIn's algorithms, along with effective strategies to make content stand out in the noisy world of social media.
- Planning, implementation and evaluation of social media campaigns.
- Growing an engaged audience, moderating comments and discussions, and dealing with difficult situations online.
- Taking truly show-stopping images for use in a social media campaign.
- Producing professional social media videos that can compete with the thousands of others out there... just by using a smartphone.
- Creating effective paid-for advertising on Facebook, Twitter & Instagram.
- Understanding the major platforms' built-in analytics tools to score and evaluate social media campaigns.

The UK has always held our veterans in high esteem. No one does Remembrance quite like us and every year millions of Brits buy poppies, lay wreaths, and mark moments of silence to commemorate those who have fought for our country. In recent years we've seen a record amount of public giving to Service Charities, honouring the sacrifice of so many in Iraq and Afghanistan.

But Governments of all colours have been historically deficient when it comes to looking after those who have served. Some brilliant initiatives and individuals have achieved genuinely excellent outcomes for our veterans.

But on the whole, services have been disjointed, hard to access and at times too focussed on inputs rather than actually asking what it feels like to be a veteran in the United Kingdom.

This Government has changed that. Established just a few days after the Prime Minister came to office one year ago, the Office for Veterans' Affairs has already overseen a significant shift in the Government's provision for veterans. From railcards to guaranteed interviews in the Civil Service; from a National Insurance holiday for employers of veterans to including a question for veterans in the 2021 census for the first time — much has been achieved. Prioritising veterans for new homes; helping shape a through-life healthcare plan in the NHS for service personnel and their families; commissioning long term studies to provide evidence-based policy for the years ahead — anyone who knows me and knows my history would

understand I wouldn't say it if it were not true: this Government has genuinely shifted the dial in these matters. And I'm proud of it.

Blending this with increasingly important private and third sector work, the ambition - to make the United Kingdom the best place in the world to be an Armed Forces veteran – is now well within grasp. But there is of course more to do.

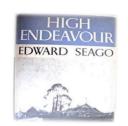

Unknown Authors



High Endeavour by Edward Seago

Gillian: I knew he had been a popular and much admired 20th Century artist. I discovered he had written it and illustrated it too. It was about a man he had met during World War II when he was in the army. The story he told was of this man's determination to become a Fighter Pilot



to serve his country. Belonging to a wandering circus family the man had many gaps in his schooling e.g. mathematics, which he had to overcome.

Being an animal trainer one of the hurdles he experienced was of being turned down, because of the evidence on his body of past encounters with lions and it showed evidence of 'repairs', at military medicals! He also had a family. It might be of interest as at the moment this period is being talked about.

I was so impressed I sourced some other second-hand copies from the Internet and spread them around! 9 / 10

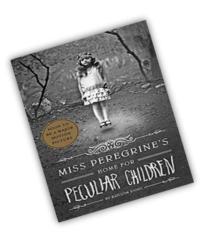
John: This is the inspirational (and true) story of a poorly-educated circus performer who decides to enlist during the 2nd World War, as a fighter pilot. He has to overcome numerous educational and administrative barriers to achieve his dream. But this man is a battler - just the sort of person his country needs at that moment in our history. And he gets there in the end, not just as a pilot, but as an officer. His success is all the more poignant because his little son, who essentially represents the generation for whom he and so many others were preparing to give their lives, dies of infection while he is still in training.

This book was given to me when I was going through a difficult period in my life!! I was thought of this book - it helped me fight my way through it: if he could do it, I was going to try my best too.

Edward Seago's style is a little difficult in places: but the book includes his own drawings illustrating each chapter (he was an accomplished artist). I can recommend this little book to anyone who is looking for an uplifting narrative (no play on words intended, although it clearly was intended in the title).

Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children by Ransom Riggs



Kev: The first thing to strike you is the stunningly atmospheric and creepy photographs throughout the book. The fact that the author's woven a strange and fast-paced narrative between the photos makes it a unique page turning read. It takes you back to being a kid.

There really is something to exploring a story with immersive and darkly-fantastical visuals to match. The dank and yet luscious Welsh countryside with its spooky, abandoned house was a great backdrop. It was great fun to read about the peculiar children and step into their world.

I think more than anything though, this is a great book to show the creative, powerful effect images can have. It makes you think of different worlds from the everyday things you see around you! 8 / 10

Pam: I don't often enjoy reading a book as much as I had hoped but,

on the whole, when I get to the end I'm glad I made the journey! With Miss P it was the other way around, I did enjoy the reading, I was very disappointed with thing as a whole. I didn't realise this book was targeted for a younger audience, if I'd have known, probably wouldn't have bought it. My fault. Having said that though, for me, the story started very strongly and, of course, it was going to be peculiar!



Jacob wants to know the truth about his grandfather stories. Finally, he and his Dad travel to what sounds like one of the wettest islands off the Welsh coast, to where his grandfather was evacuated to during the war. Jacob finds the school dilapidated, deserted, and wet but there is more to it, than that.

The photographs in the book come in their own - adding to the weird atmosphere around this story. I got over my disappointment – I found it really enjoyable, regardless of who it is actually aimed at. 7/10

Rich: The way the story is woven around the photos in this book are fantastic - and knowing they are original, un-

photoshopped photos from personal collections makes it that extra bit special. The story takes a while to get going but builds in pace well. I've seen a lot of comments saying it's a little like the X-Men (gifted children, old house, an all that) but honestly, it didn't feel that way at all when reading it. The good news is that when I finished the book, I had no idea there was a sequel.
